The daughter of a migrant worker family, Edith traveled with her family much of the year to different states for seasonal farm work before she finished school and settled in Milbridge.

Before becoming the outreach worker, Edith volunteered often at MeM, helping teach Spanish classes, interpreting, and assisting with our annual Mother's Day events. Edith commented that she has helped out before, but now it is a bigger responsibility.

"I feel very pleased that I have support from an organization like Mano en Mano," Edith said. "It makes me feel stronger to go out and help other people." Edith commented that the staff at Mano

en Mano know what is going on in the area with migrant workers, and it makes a fun, strong, united team.

Edith likes meeting people and having access to information so that she can answer clients' questions when they come in the door. "It's a good feeling," she says, "that this kind of organization exists."

Mano en Mano is a community based non-profit organization located in Milbridge, Maine. Our mission is “to build a strong community in Downeast Maine by working with diverse populations to provide affordable housing and educational opportunities, remove barriers to health and social services and to advocate for social justice.”

Programs we offer to meet our mission include Educational Workshops, Spanish courses for local community members and area businesses, English as a Second Language classes for Adults, Community Collaborations, and we are in the process of developing the first ever off-farm affordable farm labor housing in Maine.

We serve as a resource center, helping people find and connect with social services, health care, health insurance, jobs and housing.

We also do a limited amount of translation and interpretation. All our programs are offered in Spanish and English and are delivered in a culturally sensitive manner.
